New to UBC 2021 Okanagan Undergraduates: Final Report

This is a report on the findings from the New to UBC (NUBC) 2021 Survey of new UBC Okanagan undergraduate students first enrolling at UBC in September 2021. The data collection period was from August 9 to August 30, 2021.

BACKGROUND

The New to UBC (NUBC) survey is conducted annually of new, incoming undergraduate students of both UBC campuses, UBC Vancouver and UBC Okanagan. The survey provides a snapshot of what new, incoming UBC undergraduate students have experienced before they begin their UBC studies in September, including information of their prior knowledge, abilities, points of view, and their perceived needs and concerns. This information helps the UBC administration in its efforts to support the students' transition from high school or another post-secondary institution to UBC.

METHODOLOGY

All new, incoming UBCO undergraduate students were invited to participate in the NUBC survey (N=2994) online via email on August 9, 2021. Four reminders were sent, about every four to five days after the first day.

Both direct-entry undergraduates entering UBCO from high school (N=2355) and undergraduates transferring from another post-secondary institution (N=639) were invited. *All analyses in this report focus on new direct-entry UBCO undergraduates.*

The survey instrument was significantly revised in 2021 to better align the questions with the current strategic priorities of UBC, reducing comparability to the 2020 version. The Executive summary contains some comparisons between the two years, but the body of the report does not.

¹ In Qualtrics a complete response is when a student clicks "submit" at the end of the survey. A partial response indicates the student did not click "submit" at the end.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Overall satisfaction with UBC. New UBCO domestic undergraduates in 2021 report the same levels of satisfaction with their overall experience with UBC (2021: 74% 2020: 74%) whereas international students report higher levels of satisfaction this year (2021: 75%, 2020: 71%).

UBC communications. Most UBCO undergraduates feel that their communications from UBC are sent at the right time (59% domestic, 69% international). They are either satisfied with how often they receive email communication from UBC (59% domestic, 57% international) or would like to receive email communication more often (33% domestic, 39% international). They are fairly satisfied with communications on what precautions UBC has taken to protect students and updates on how UBC is proceeding with COVID-19 (62% domestic, 70% international), although they are less satisfied with UBC's communication regarding student housing for this year (42% domestic, 57% international).

Course registration. New UBCO undergraduates in 2021 had a positive overall experience registering for their classes. They knew the date and time their course registration opened (91% domestic, 90% international) and most felt that they had enough time to create their work lists for registration (83% domestic, 84% international). They were less likely to say they received course selection and registration support in a timely manner (66% domestic, 73% international).

What do undergraduates want to get out of their UBC education? (1) Finding a meaningful career, (2) personal growth and development, and (3) community, friendship, personal connection are the most important outcomes that new UBCO undergraduates want from their UBC education.

Health and wellbeing. Most new UBCO undergraduates say they currently have access to a family doctor or other specialists (79% domestic, 52% international). While only a minority are currently receiving or accessing mental health support (19% domestic, 16% international), many are concerned about their mental health while studying at UBC (52% domestic, 41% international).

Stress management. This year, new UBCO undergraduates report less confidence in their ability to succeed in their courses than reported in 2020 for both domestic (2021: 61%, 2020: 72%) and international (2021: 72%, 2020: 78%) students. Similarly, domestic (2021: 55%, 2020: 72%) and international (2021: 69%, 2020: 80%) students report less confidence in their ability to cope with the demands of life.

Living arrangements / Commute. Most new UBCO undergraduates (60% domestic, 77% international) report they plan to live on campus. A few live near campus on Academy Hill or Quail Ridge (7% domestic, 4% international), or in other areas of the Central Okanagan (30% domestic, 6% international), Of those commuting, the majority report they expect a half hour or less to commute to UBCO (64% domestic, 72% international)².

² In 2020, transportation question was asked of all students who were planning to live on campus, near campus or in the campus region (Lower Mainland or Central Okanagan). In 2021, transportation question was only asked of students who responded that they are planning to commute to campus.

Immigration issues. 87% of new international UBCO undergraduates report they plan to come to Canada to study at UBC this term (Sep to Dec 2021).

- 6% because they plan to study outside of Canada next term.
- 7% say they do not know where they plan to live yet.

In August, the majority of new international UBCO undergraduates may have dealt with immigration issues:

- Most (82%) had applied for their study permit; just 8% said they had not applied yet.
- 19% said they had applied for their study permit but were waiting "longer than normal" for their completed application to be processed.
- 12% said they had applied recently and were waiting for their completed application to be processed.
- 3% said they had applied but were waiting to give biometrics or take a medical exam.

Travel issues. Most new international UBCO undergraduates (69%) report that they expected to experience travel issues or restrictions. Only 31% say "not applicable / I do not need to deal with travel restrictions." Over half (52%) report difficulties traveling to Canada from a country other than the United States, and about a third (32%) report difficulties with flight availability.

Financial impact / concerns. The majority of new UBCO undergraduates (52% domestic, 57% international) report that their financial situation has been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. New international UBCO undergraduates, compared to their domestic counterparts, are more likely to report that the COVID-19 pandemic means they have used more of their own savings or their family's savings (26% domestic, 33% international).

A minority of domestic (2021: 6%, 2020: 13%) and international (2021: 11%, 2020: 14%) new UBCO students report that the COVID-19 pandemic has had a "very significant" or "significant" impact on their ability to finance their upcoming academic year in 2021³. Similarly, international students have less concern this fall about their ability to finance their initial year at UBC (2021: 16%, 2020: 23%) whereas domestic students have similar levels of concern (2021: 10%, 2020: 11%).

Funding / scholarship. New UBCO undergraduates generally rely on their parents to fund their tuition and living costs. On average, domestic students report they receive 52% of funding from their parents, and international students report 82%, similar to previous NUBC survey data. Domestic students reported that even without a scholarship or financial award from UBC they would have been able to attend UBC (2021: 88% 2020: 91%). However, international students were less likely to report they would have been able to attend UBC in 2021 without a scholarship or bursary (2021: 64% 2020: 80%).

Domestic undergraduates this year say that they still would have chosen to attend UBC even if they had not received the UBC scholarship or financial award (2021: 75% 2020: 76%) but a lower proportion of international students indicated that they still would have selected UBC (2021: 40% 2020: 60%).



SUMMARY OF FINDINGS


The following analyses includes new direct-entry domestic and international UBCO undergraduates. Much of the New to UBC survey changed in 2021, with either new questions, reworded questions, or changed response options. Due to these changes, comparisons with NUBC 2020 are not made in this report.

Section 1: Where students live

The majority of new UBCO undergraduates report living outside of the Central Okanagan (73% domestic, 98% international) at the time of the survey.





The majority of new to UBCO undergraduates plan to live either on or near to campus (domestic 67%, international 81%).




Section 2: Overall Experience


The majority of new UBCO undergraduates report being "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with their experiences with UBC so far (74% domestic, 75% international).







The majority of new UBCO undergraduates feel quite positive about being a UBC student, as shown below.






New UBCO undergraduates rate themselves as most "concerned" or "very concerned" about maintaining their GPA (44% domestic, 53% international) or travelling to Canada in time for the start of term (34% domestic, 60% international).






In general, new to UBCO undergraduates have some social concerns and are most likely to rate themselves as "concerned" or "very concerned" about being overwhelmed with all the things they're expected to do in their first semester (53% domestic, 44% international). Coping with expectations of parents and family is quite a bit higher for International students, so too is personal safety, discrimination, finding a group of people where they belong, and having a suitable place to study while living outside Canada as areas of concern.








The majority of new UBCO undergraduates have a very positive mindset about the future and their education as shown below.




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New UBCO undergraduates are less agreeable with the question "I feel included, supported, and respected in my university interactions," compared to the strongly positive answers to the other questions.





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











A notable number of new UBCO undergraduates have not heard of Academic Essentials, a set of three academic preparation courses that start in July before the fall semester. (42% domestic, 23% international).




Of new to UBCO undergraduates who indicated that they did enroll in Academic Essentials, domestic students are far less likely to enroll in readiness for university mathematics (30%), whereas international students strongly prefer all three courses.



When asked questions about their preparedness to begin their studies, new UBCO undergraduates are least likely to "Agree" or "Strongly Agree" that they know what to do to prepare for their classes in September (27% domestic, 40% international).








Finding a meaningful career is the most commonly first ranked item new UBCO undergraduates (39% domestic, 33% international) hope to get from their education at UBC.






Section 6: Course Registrations

The majority of new UBCO undergraduates generally "Agree" or "Strongly Agree" that they had a positive registration experience.




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
Section 7: Transportation

Of new UBCO undergraduates who plan to commute, most plan to travel to campus five or more days a week (62% domestic, 48% international).




Of commuting new UBCO undergraduates, domestic students expect to use a vehicle (55%) or public transit (28%). International students expect to use public transit (60%) or walk (20%).



About a third of new UBCO undergraduates expect commutes longer than half an hour to UBCO (34% domestic, 28% international).






International students are most likely to not have access to a doctor or other specialists (48%).




Most new UBCO undergraduates are not currently accessing mental health supports in their home community.




Mental health is a noticeable concern for new UBCO undergraduates.




Most students are aware of at least one of the listed health related resources available at UBCO (75% domestic, 78% international).



Domestic new to UBCO students are less likely than their international counterparts to "Agree" or "Strongly" agree on all seven wellbeing measures shown below.







Section 9: Financial impact/concerns




Of new UBCO undergraduates, 6% of domestic and 19% of international students received a scholarship or financial award from UBC.




New international UBCO undergraduates were most likely to say that they would not have been able to attend without a scholarship or financial award from UBC (36%).


Section 10: COVID-19

The majority of new UBCO undergraduates have had some kind of financial situation change as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic (52% domestic, 57% international).








Section 11: Study Permit

Most (86%) of new international UBCO undergraduates report needing to apply for or extend a study permit.



Section 13: Disability Accommodation

Most new UBCO undergraduates report they do not have a disability (64% domestic, 83% international). The most commonly reported disabilities are mental health (17% domestic, 6% international) or Neurological (10% domestic, 3% international).
